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Local pride inspires high quality projects in County Heritage Awards


THE PRIDE of the citizens of Co Galway in their local areas was evident in the quality of the entries in this year's County Heritage Awards.

From projects mapping local field and townland names, through recording of the names on gravestones in cemeteries, on to publishing books of real value, and to the heights of building restoration, the judges were spoiled for choice when it came to deciding on winners.

This was evident in the unprecedented number of Highly Commended awards given to projects which in previous years might have been among the winners.

The overall winner was the Portumna Workhouse restoration project, an ambitious scheme which is still very much a work in progress and will remain so for many

Another large-scale project, which won the Oranmore Area Award, was the restoration of Claregalway Castle by Dr Eamon O'Donoghue and his team.

In the publishing section, an outstanding work of scholarship was the publication of Leabhar Inis Bearachain, based on a collection of manuscripts written by a man called Michael Connolly on Inis Bearachain in the far south-west of Connemara in 1882. The main editing work was done by an Irish-speaking German, Andreas Vogel.

The winner of the Tuam area was the Milltown Community Council for their support of the restoration to a high standard of the Jockey's Monument, which is the only tangible link with the Cromwellian deportations, known to history in the phrase "To Hell or to Con-

Accepting the award on behalf of the Community Council, Michael Rhatigan thanked all who had helped with the work, and particularly the landowner who gave access to the monument and allowed an entrance to be built.

At the awards ceremony in the Meadow Court Hotel, Loughrea on Thursday, which was very well attended by elected representatives, community groups, schools and individuals, Cllr Michael Maher, County Mayor, said "Our heritage belongs to each one of us and it is vital that it is valued and appreciated at a local level if we are to manage, preserve and protect it. It is clear from the number, quality and calibre of the Heritage Award, that our built, natural and cultural heritage is valued at a local level."

Many tributes were paid at the ceremony to County Heritage Officer Marie Mannion, whose drive and encouragement inspired many of the

The monument is known thus as local folklore has it that Edmund Hopkins who was leading the hunt fell off his horse and was killed while jumping the ditch at this point. The monument dates back to 1686 and is the only known monument to have a direct link to the

phrase "To Hell or to Connacht" as it commemorates the Hopkins family who were evicted from Leinster under Cromwell. Runner Up: Glenamaddy

Ms Forde researched and published a book Crumlin National School 125 years 1885-2010. Interviews from past pupils document the way of life in the area and the history of the local Railway Station (Ballyglunin) and the importance of the railway in the life of the local people. Documents retrieved from the National Archives give a history of the built heritage. All copies of documents from the National Archives, old photographs, and the Schools' Manuscript Collection 1937-1938 for Crumlin National School were displayed at a book launch held in the school in December 2010 and are available for viewing at any time in the school. Publication of the book and the book launch was of great significance to the community and has initiated a renewed interest and discussion in local history and heritage.

The Aras Mhuire Heritage & Folklore Group's intergenerational project in which the local secondary students interviewed and captured the life stories, histories, traditions and events from the early 19th Century has resulted in the production of a beautiful book, Opening Doors, Recalling Memories of Yesteryear. This book will be a very important heritage resource in the future for people in the wider community and county.

Children's Burial Ground Committee, Scotland, Glenamaddy

In the townland of Scotland there is a killeen in the centre of a ringfort. It is difficult to estimate the number of burials due to the abundance of trees and undergrowth. The Children's Burial Ground Committee has organised the access to the Lios, the construction of a path to the site, the placing of an inscribed plaque and gate. It also organised a Mass for the consecration of the burial ground on June 19, 2011. It has helped to increase Community awareness of the existence of such

sites.

Ten years of work have Knockroon NS produced a gone in to St Enda's cemedocumentary on the Cong tery, Spiddal, and the old monastery building that survives there. Kiltartan NS

> Kiltartan National School produced a film documentary entitled The Townlands of Kiltartan. The school mapped out and researched the origins of the names of each of the 22 townlands that constitute Kiltartan. The 5th and 6th class pupils visited each of the townlands. They have brought to life the area as it looked 1,000 years ago and it will serve as a valuable heritage resource to the present community of Kiltartan.

The pupils of these schools were invited to replicate the Schools' Folklore Scheme 1937-8. The pupils responded with essays collected from their elders.

The project will be a valuable source for the local historian and it will allow future comparison with the 1930s way of life.
