Similarly, Kerry have a new captain in David Clifford and he too deserves our best wishes as one of the brightest talents in the game.

The leagues captivate and enthrall in equal measure with teams across all four grades seeking honours in competitive divisions. We can look forward to the action of the coming weeks and a stretch in the evenings that combined, herald the onset of Spring.

I wish everyone involved in all three encounters every best wish in their respective endeavours and trust supporters of all six competing teams will enjoy their visit to Croke Park.

Thanks also to our match officials on what is a busy day at headquarters and to our competition sponsors AIB and Allianz for their ongoing support in the promotion of our games.

Oughterard have had a tough path to the final. After overcoming Micheál Breathnach in a penalty shootout to win the Galway showpiece for the first time since 2001, they have gone from

strength-to-strength with a convincing win in the Connacht final over The Neale of Mayo, followed by a surprise victory over Templeoe of Kerry in the semi-final, winning 1-12 to 0-12.

Na Gaeil of Kerry have been in imperious form on their march to the final. The Tralee based club enjoyed a thumping 18-point win over Mullinahone in the Munster final, before battling past Kilmaine of Mayo in the semi-final, emerging victorious in extra-time on a scoreline of 0-13 to 1-9.

Rathgarogue-Cushinstown became the first Wexford club to lift the Leinster JFC earlier this season, and now have their eyes on a first All-Ireland crown. The Slaneyside champions overcame Blackhill Emeralds of Monaghan in the semi-final, in a tight game; 1-7 to 1-6.

It is our privilege to support #TheToughest championship in sport. The GAA is central to all communities in Ireland, and is built on qualities such as hard work, support and dedication – qualities which AIB are proud to champion and inspire us every day.

I wish you all the very best of luck in this weekend's AIB GAA All-Ireland Intermediate and Junior Club Football Championship Finals.

CLUB GAME STILL SHINES AFTER SPOTLIGHT FADES

Long after the spotlight of inter-county GAA has faded, the club championships still retain a beguiling appeal for players who have lit up our games in the past.

Nearly every year when we come back to Croke Park for these most special of occasions – the junior and intermediate club finals – there is at least one player involved who regularly strode the same sward here in very different circumstances during the not-too-distant high summers.

Wearing an unfamiliar kit, looking a little softer around the belly and greyer around the temple now, these indefatigable old heroes can seem strangely out of context in the echoey surrounds of a near-empty stadium.

And yet they always find their way here, a flash of brilliance – a silken touch, a brilliant turn, a crisply struck pass – taking us back to the glories of their halcyon days, reminding us of what it was that made – makes! – them a cut above the rank and file club players.

Chances are the last time you thought about Tommy Freeman was seven years ago, when he last lined out for Monaghan here against Tyrone in an All-Ireland quarter-final.

Shortly afterwards he retired from the inter-county scene and, for all the world, his Gaelic football career faded to black. The reality, of course, is that he has been toiling away with Magheraclone in the intervening years.

That Freeman – 39 next month – arrives back in Croke Park chasing an All-Ireland title 19 years after making his inter-county debut and 13 years since he won an All-Star says everything about what Magheraclone means to him.

What a nine-carat star can do for other players in a small club is elevate them to places they never knew they were capable of existing. They provide a marker for others to reach and an example to follow.

Others are here to make amends, to give something back to their club and their people after many years involved with inter-county set-ups when they had no

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choice but to allow their club involvement to take a back seat.

Tommy Walsh, a nine time All-Star and All-Ireland winner who lined out here last weekend, appeared to derive more personal satisfaction from his journey with his club side Tullaroan than all of the accolades he won in black and amber.

Interviewed by former GAA President Nickey Brennan after the final whistle of the Kilkenny Intermediate Hurling Championship last November, the 36-year-old explained why the win meant so much to him: "This is for the Tullaroan people," he said, his voice cracking. "For years I was off celebrating with Kilkenny and the Tullaroan people were great to me, backed me up, but I wanted to share something with them and we shared it together.

"I never had that my whole adult life, I could never share victory with Tullaroan and thank God now we can share it for the whole winter."

Others are here because they don't accept the dying of the light, can't bear the thought of packing the boots away under the stairs for the last time.

And others still want the fairytale ending – to walk away from it all as an All-Ireland champion in Croke Park, bowing out alongside the people that mean the most to them, side by side with family, friends and neighbours.

Two years ago, Tyrone great and three-time All-Ireland winner Seán Cavanagh won the All-Ireland Intermediate title with Moy six months after his inter-county career ended in a bitterly disappointing All-Ireland final defeat to Dublin.

"Maybe there was a bigger plan out there," he said after the game. "Maybe I was meant to leave with my family on a bigger day like this at Croke Park. That's what it feels like right now. "It's right up there, it's so much different but so much more beautiful in so many ways. There are lads there obviously I've been playing with since I was eight years of age on that team.

"With the county there's the masses, there's the euphoria that spreads the country, (but) the intimacy, the closeness, the sheer emotion you have from winning with your community, your friends, everyone you're going to live your entire life with is such a special feeling."

Other famous names have chased that same high on this special occasion.

Éamonn Fitzmaurice, the former Kerry manager, orchestrated Finuge's run to the Intermediate final in 2013 alongside his brother-in-law Paul Galvin, while Owen Mulligan did the damage and lifted the trophy for the winners, Fr Rocks.

Darran O'Sullivan's speed and class were instrumental as Glenbeigh-Glencar brought the junior title to the Iveragh Peninsula in 2017.

The list goes on...There are many reasons why some of the greats of our games keep cropping up in these finals but we should savour the chance to see them maybe one last time on this special occasion.

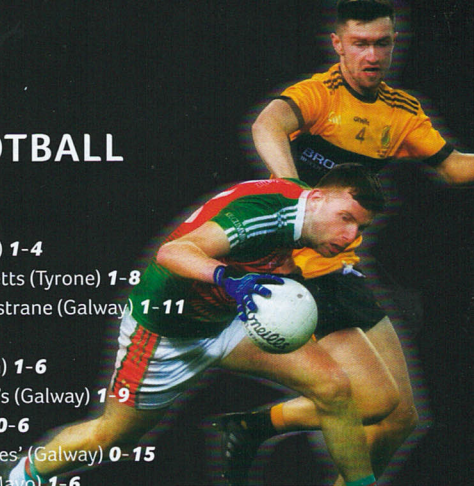
